

THE CENTRE NATIONAL DES ARTS PLASTIQUES LAUNCHES RESTORATION OF JEAN TINGUELY'S LE CYCLOP

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In March 2021 the Centre national des arts plastiques (Cnap) initiated restoration of *Le Cyclop*, a total artwork conceptualised by the Swiss artist Jean Tinguely. The site, at the heart of woodland in Milly-la-Forêt, closed in October 2020 in preparation for this major restoration project, which will take just over a year. It is scheduled to reopen to the public in May 2022.

LE CYCLOP, A SHARED ADVENTURE THAT BEGAN IN 1969 AND CONTINUES TODAY

The idea for this monumental artwork took root in the imaginations of Jean Tinguely and his friend and fellow Swiss artist, Bernard Luginbühl. From the outset, Le Cyclop's characteristic modular metal structure was always intended to be a collective endeavour, to be shared with other artists: Niki de Saint Phalle, Eva Aeppli, Arman, César, Daniel Spoerri, Jean-Pierre Raynaud, Jesús-Rafael Soto, Rico Weber, Larry Rivers, Seppi Imhof, Philippe Bouveret and Pierre Marie Lejeune. All these artists created works for Le Cyclop, becoming part of an extraordinary adventure that lasted from 1969 until 1994. So as to ensure it would be protected and preserved for the long term, Jean Tinguely and Niki de Saint Phalle donated Le Cyclop to the French State in 1987. Since then, the Centre national des arts plastiques has been in charge of its conservation. The Association Le Cyclop, a non-profit that was set up in 1988, opens the site to visitors between April and end October, with programming that encourages new ways of seeing this multifarious work.

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A VAST RESTORATION PROJECT

The topography of the site in addition to weather exposure makes conservation of Le Cyclop particularly challenging. The objective today is to restore Le Cyclop's integrity, working with the artists or their beneficiaries. This complex project is overseen by three contractors: GFTK for architectural aspects, Phung Consulting for HVAC and Ecovi for quantity surveying. Throughout the project, a team of some twenty specialists in glass. metal, ceramic, textile, plaster and contemporary materials will work on-site and in their studios to restore the various elements that make up Le Cyclop.

TWO CRITICAL ASPECTS OF THE RESTORATION PROJECT: LA FACE AUX MIROIRS AND HOMMAGE AUX DÉPORTÉS

The main element requiring restoration is **Niki de Saint Phalle**'s *La Face aux miroirs* (1986). Its mirrored surface (almost 325 m²) began to show signs of deterioration in 1996, with visible alterations to the silvering and the presence of microorganisms that were loosening the mirrors. Initial attempts to consolidate the structure were made in 2002. In 2006 repairs were carried out on small areas. Two years later, in 2008, a study programme was implemented with the Institut National du Patrimoine. This resulted in a timeline recording the stages in the creation of *Le Cyclop*, a condition report and a diagnosis that included recommendations for long-term restoration. This document provided valuable information. However, the work continued to deteriorate, putting visitors' safety at risk.

Netting was placed over the structure in January 2012. The Laboratoire de Recherche des Monuments Historiques was commissioned to survey the physical condition of the work. It presented its report in 2014. Following this, and with the authorisation of the beneficiary of Jean Tinguely and Niki de Saint Phalle, Cnap announced a full-scale restoration that would replace the 55,000 mirror tesserae. This operation scrupulously respects the original layout, supervised by Niki de Saint Phalle: the mirrors must be cut with no right angles and their size adapted to fit the curve of the face. For the replacement mirrors to exactly match the initial composition, a latex print is made of each zone then transferred onto paper to create templates for the individual pieces. The new mirrors will restore the face's shiny appearance while respecting the artist's intention that the myriad reflections become a form of camouflage. Companies donated materials and competencies to the project in 2013. 3DO Reality Capture carried out a 3D scan of the structure. Saint-Gobain gifted 628 m² of solar mirrors and, through its Weber subsidiary, mortar. Clairefontaine supplied paper for the templates.



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HOMMAGE AUX DÉPORTÉS

The second major restoration concerns **Eva Aeppli**'s *Hommage aux déportés*. This evocation of the horror of the Shoah is composed of a 1930s train carriage, suspended from a platform more than 13 metres above the ground. Inside are 15 figures made from white silk and brown velvet. The carriage is currently in a state of advanced disrepair and will be identically restored. The damaged wood panels will be treated. Thermal insulation and a new air-conditioning system inside the wagon will ensure a sufficiently stable environment for the proper conservation of the silk and velvet figures. This restoration is also an opportunity to review the watertightness of the basin in Jean Tinguely's *Hommage à Yves Klein*, and to restore or clean some of the works inside *Le Cyclop: Colonne* by Niki de Saint Phalle, *Méta-Harmonie* by Jean Tinguely, *Jauge* by Jean-Pierre Raynaud, *Pénétrable sonore* by Jesús-Rafael Soto, *Hommage à Mai 68* by Larry Rivers, *Tableau électrique* by Rico Weber and *Piccolo museo* by Giovanni Battista Podestà.

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A 1.2 MILLION EUROS BUDGET

The budget for the restoration of *Le Cyclop* totals €1.2 million, funded by Cnap with support from the Ministry of Culture and a number of patrons. In addition to essential contributions from Saint-Gobain and from 3DO Reality Capture, which carried out a 3D laser scan of Niki de Saint Phalle's *La Face aux miroirs*, Crédit Agricole Île-de-France and Fondation du Crédit Agricole are partner to an educational



programme involving students at two technical colleges. The remainder of the budget came from two crowdfunding campaigns (MyMajorCompany and Commeon), and from donations by Geoterre and Galerie Georges-Philippe et Nathalie Vallois.

EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS BUILT AROUND THE RESTORATION OF LE CYCLOP AND NEW VISITOR FACILITIES

The Centre national des arts plastiques continues to support the next generation of art and culture professionals by rolling out two educational projects for students at technical colleges during the restoration of *Le Cyclop*. Students working towards a diploma in contemporary glass design and production at Lycée Lucas de Nehou will be given training then invited to assist with restoration of Niki de Saint Phalle's *La Face aux miroirs*. Year 11 and Year 12 students at Lycée Brassaï–Lycée Professionnel Régional de la Photographie et de l'Image will consider the implications and challenges of documenting a restoration project and the specific environment of *Le Cyclop*.

In addition, third- and fifth-year students at École Nationale Supérieure d'Architecture de Paris-Belleville submitted their ideas on how to develop the area around *Le Cyclop* and its future visitor centre. An exhibition of their work is planned for September 2021 in Milly-la-Forêt.
